He recalled: "There were a lot of people behind bars, especially labourers....It opened my eyes that this is my duty." He added that it was important for him to ensure the men returned home in time for Ramadan, which starts in the UAE this year on July 10th. He told reporters: "Ramadan is the month for giving, so I want to put greater effort into getting these prisoners back to their own countries...and reunited with their families."
